M-PBEA Board Nominations

Applicants are needed for three officer positions on the Mountain-Plains Board. Each elected position will begin July 1, 2013. Candidates must be NBEA/M-PBEA members in good standing. The positions are President-elect, Treasurer and NBEA Director. Each of these positions requires a three-year commitment. Each state in the Mountain-Plains Region is encouraged to nominate qualified members for each of these positions.

Candidates for M-PBEA President-elect must have served three years on the M-PBEA Board. Their term would cover 2013-14 as Presidentelect, 2014-15 as President, and 2015-16 as Pastpresident. As President-elect, this person is responsible for administering the M-PBEA Awards program. As President, overseeing the business of the regional association and presiding at the annual conference are the primary duties. As Past-president, the Leadership Development Institute is under their direction.

Candidates for M-PBEA Treasurer can be any NBEA/M-PBEA member in good standing and who is interested in serving on the M-PBEA Board in an officer position. Duties of the M-PBEA Treasurer are those common to such office, including the preparation of the annual budget with help of the executive officers. Handling the financial matters of the Association are the duties of this position.

Candidates for NBEA Director must have served three years on the M-PBEA Board and a NBEA/M-PBEA member in good standing for five years. This position requires attendance at the fall and spring board meetings, at NBEA as a representative for Mountain-Plains members, and at M-PBEA to report from NBEA. They will assist the Regional and State Membership Directors in recruiting and maintaining membership, as well as oversee the Regional fundraiser at the annual convention.
